

Direct Services funding consists of federal and state dollars for Workforce Development and Aging program services provided to the counties in the Upper Savannah region based on performance, need and eligibility. The COG administers these two programs under contract for direct service delivery and is responsible for the allocation and fiscal administration of these dollars. The funds assist in delivering services that provide for the health, welfare and employment of certain segments of a county's population, thus easing the financial and administrative burden on local governments.

McCormick County Highlights

Town of McCormick Main Street Streetscape – CDBG request for \$500,000 funded in November 2017. Local match of \$56,600 for total project estimate of \$556,600. Project utilized CDBG funds to continue the Town's streetscape efforts by upgrading curb and guttering, upgrading sidewalks and crosswalks to meet ADA requirements, and landscaping. An emergency call box was installed as a public safety element. The project addressed the need to provide a safe pedestrian pathway for citizens to get to goods and services in the Town. Project bid was over budget. Project scope was reduced and bid again on April 4, 2019. Project construction began in fall 2019 and was completed in 2020.

Industrial Training Center – Piedmont Technical College was awarded a \$1,500,000 EDA grant to fund a portion of the Upstate Center for Manufacturing Excellence. This 45,000 square foot state of the art industrial training center will benefit workers and industries in the college's service area. The total project cost is \$12,453,414. Construction of this facility was completed in August 2020 and the Upper Savannah COG staff administered the project on behalf of the College.

CARES Act Grant Application – McCormick County applied for EDA CARES Act funds with the help of Upper Savannah COG staff. The project was to involve basic infrastructure improvements to serve a 37-acre parcel that is part of the Highway 28 Industrial Park. The total project cost was to be \$853,200 with \$682,560 being requested from EDA. Upper Savannah was recently notified that the project was not funded due to lack of funds.

Focus on Manufacturing – The largest need in the Upper Savannah area is preparing workers for jobs in manufacturing. There are hundreds of jobs which are unfilled and several thousand job seekers in the Upper Savannah region. The Upper Savannah Workforce Development Board works with both businesses and job seekers to address short-term and long-term needs. Upper Savannah developed linkages with workforce boards in Anderson, Greenville and Spartanburg to start improving the pool of manufacturing workers in the Greater Upstate Region.

SC Works – SC Works Centers are the focal point of the workforce development system. More than a thousand job seekers were matched with jobs through the SC Works system.

WIOA Enrollment – Workforce Investment and Opportunity Act (WIOA) enrollment totaled 322 in FY 2020. Enrollment figure was down from last year due to low unemployment in the first part of the year, the challenges of the pandemic beginning in March, and a reduction in WIOA funding.

Outreach – Upper Savannah is best known for its innovative approaches to reaching job seekers and employers. It has had a large event in October, but the March event was canceled due to the pandemic. The Upper Savannah Facebook feeds reach thousands each week.

McCormick County Workforce Development – Helped 2,112 job seekers in McCormick County. Held county job fair to help workers of Georgia Pacific. Hosted hiring event for Burger King in the SC Works Center.

Economic Development Administration (EDA) Update – Maintained the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) to keep the region eligible for EDA funding. Assisted in the development of four project applications for CARES Act funding in Edgefield, Laurens, McCormick, and Saluda counties. Developed an EDA CARES Act application to hire an Economic

Recovery Specialist for the region to help local governments deal with federal and state COVID-19 related requirements and funding opportunities. This application was funded.

Census 2020 – Due to COVID-19 restrictions, in-person Census activities were halted in February and did not restart until later in the year. Assisted with Census promotion as much as feasible using social media and other formats for other types of meetings.

Planning Commissioner Certification – Hosted numerous workshops to get planning commissioner, zoning appeals board members, and staff certified. Across the region, 58 people had received the required training. COVID-19 requirements have reduced the numbers this year because in-person training and certification stopped and individual on-line training was allowed.

Upper Savannah Land Trust – Continued providing technical assistance to the Upper Savannah Land Trust.

Transportation Planning – Continued working with SCDOT on various transportation planning projects. Developed a draft Long-Range Plan with assistance in ranking projects from SCDOT.

Transit – Received, reviewed, and ranked transit grants from regional providers and forwarded them on to SCDOT.

Environmental Reviews – Completed environmental reviews for Community Development Block Grant projects through January 2020.

Americans with Disabilities Act – Continued updating ADA plans for local governments as needed.

County and Municipal Clerks Meeting – Organized and hosted a regional meeting for county and municipal clerks to discuss topics of common interest.

HOME – Continued monitoring completed projects with the HOME Investment Partnership Program. HOME is a HUD-funded program that provides rehab or new construction funding for homes of low-income individuals and rental units. Monitoring tenant income and rent levels will continue for the next 20 years. There is no more local funding in this program.

InfoMentum – Continued working with the data management and mapping tool accessed through a partnership with Appalachian COG. The InfoMentum program allows staff to produce quick maps for grant applications and also to use layers of demographic information to focus projects on the most needy areas. ACOG in Greenville staffs and maintains this program and USCOG is a subscribing partner.

Planning Assistance in the County – Continued assisting various municipal and county planning commissions with development or zoning questions as needed. Assisted McCormick County in developing an RFP to assist in the updating of their zoning ordinance.

Aging & Disability Resource Center (ADRC) Services – The Upper Savannah Aging & Disability Resource Center (ADRC) provides, coordinates and contracts for services to the Upper Savannah region's senior population. In addition to the regional services through the ADRC, Upper Savannah contracts with the region's senior centers and other providers to meet the needs of senior

adults. Contracted services include transportation, home-delivered meals, congregate dining with activities, home care, and health and wellness promotion.

State Health Insurance Program (SHIP) – The SHIP program helps seniors and individuals with disabilities research and understand Medicare coverage options with their Medicare prescription drug plans and Medicare Advantage plans. This Program also counsels and assists beneficiaries with Medicare Part A & B issues and Medigap coverage, and alerts seniors to fraudulent Medicare and Medicaid practices through the Senior Medicare Patrol Program. The Upper Savannah SHIP Program made 1,576 contacts and attended 14 outreach events from July 1, 2019 to June 30, 2020.

Family Caregiver Support Program (FCSP) – Program provided funding to 308 caregivers as well as information, assistance, education, support, and referrals to many more throughout the region. The program provides respite, which is a break from daily care-giving that is important in helping caregivers do a better job over a longer period of time. The program also helps caregivers with supplemental services, such as incontinent supplies and assistive technology. The FCSP also continues to be available for grandparents 55 and older caring for grandchildren 18 and younger. Many grandparents take on the parental role in order to keep the grandchildren out of the overburdened foster care system. The FCSP helps those grandparents who have stepped into the role of parent due to death, incarceration or other parental problems with some funded services as well as information and support groups.

Information, Referral and Assistance (IR&A) – The IR&A program is designed to provide seniors and people with disabilities access to helpful resources. Upper Savannah staff includes two certified IR&A specialists.

Home Safety Program – The program has helped many individuals throughout the region with projects that improve unsafe areas in the home, including the building of handicap accessible ramps and installation of handrails, grab bars, etc. The AAA helped 71 people in the Home Safety Program throughout the region during FY 2020.

Assistive Technology (lifelines) – Program assisted approximately 36 seniors throughout the region with lifelines.

Legal Services Program – Program served 35 seniors with various legal concerns such as Power of Attorney, will preparation, and grandparent custody issues. Attorneys throughout the region have agreed to work with the ADRC at reasonable rates to better serve the senior population.

Home Care Program – Upper Savannah AAA provides a Home Care Program that helps seniors who are in need of services such as light housekeeping and some personal care. The program provides consumer choice for the seniors and their families and adds support to keeping older persons in their homes as long as possible. The program served 148 people in FY 2020.

Advocate for Senior Citizens – Continued to serve as an advocate for 2,242 seniors in the region's nursing homes and residential care facilities through the continued administration of the Regional Ombudsman Program. The Regional Long-Term Care Ombudsman investigates and works to resolve problems or complaints affecting residents in nursing homes and residential care facilities. The Ombudsman also educates residents and family members about long term care and related issues while advocating for the protection of the resident's rights.
